FOOTBALL MOGULS IN ANNUAL MEETING

Some Changes in Rules Are To Be up for Discussion

By DIXON STEWART United Press Staff Correspondent NEW YORK, Dec. 28. (AP)—Football's annual year-end gabfest—the meetings of coaches, officials, players, fans and athletic leaders—is under way with all participants united in a move to make football safe for football players.

Forty-four players have been killed this season.

The Eastern Football Officials' association, the Eastern Committee for Selection of Football Officials, the Sportsmanship Brotherhood, the Football Coaches' association and the National Collegiate Athletic association—previously have been divergent and some times actually contending objects for their meetings. But they're united this week.

There is less harmony on the means than on the end desired. Officials and many coaches believe the rules need only a few minor changes. The N.C.A.A. reputedly will seek elimination of the "flying wedge" and kickoff plays and the kickoff itself. Changes advocated by some leaders are opposed by others. But in the end it is expected the meetings will unite in recommendations to the national rules committee and that this committee will take definite action in February.

Officials appeared in agreement upon the admission of the "flying wedge," the return of the kickoff and the setting back of the kickoff from the 40 to the 30 yard line.

The officials expressed the opinion that many injuries occur when a man who has been knocked down and has no way of protection.

Christian Science Church A Lesson-Sermon on the subject "Christian Science" was presented on Sunday, December 27, in all Christian Science churches, branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

A correlative passage from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, stated, "Throughout all generations both before and after the Christian era, the Christ, as the spiritual idea,—the reflection of God,—has come with some measure of power and grace to all prepared to receive Christ, Truth."

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BEAUMONT PROVIDES QUARTERS FOR IDLE

An Average of 22 Homeless Men a Night Given Lodging

(Special Press Correspondence) BEAUMONT, Dec. 28.—Beaumont has found a good use for some of its vacant store buildings. The double store space below the M.V.A. hall on California avenue has been turned into two lodging houses and living quarters, the north side being utilized for the entertainment over night of the many itinerants who daily pass along our highways, bound for, they know not where, but who ask for aid from the local welfare association.

In this large space, heated by a stove and fuel from the municipal woodpile, has been since November 14, the lodging house for homeless travelers at an average of 22 per night, according to Justice Philip Truby, Sr., who has this matter in charge.

"Of the 22," said Judge Truby, "an average of four were trying to work an hour for a meal. One evening we had 47 men of an average of 19 years of age, though one man confessed to being 52 and another 60. Several were only 14 years of age. Only five Spanish War veterans have come to the flop house and but seven American Legion men, all of whom referred to apply to the local post for aid and thus become a burden to their comrades.

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WILL PLANT EIGHTY TREES FROM JAPAN

Guy Bogart Makes Plans for Cherry Blossom Festival at Beaumont

(Special Press Correspondence) BEAUMONT, Dec. 28.—The Olympic Year Japanese Cherry Blossom festival will be held next April 3 in International park and Bogart bowl. In preparation for this fiesta there will be planted in January in and about Beaumont and the approaches of International park a group of 80 Japanese cherry trees, noted the world over for their pink blooms. These trees are the gift of the Japanese societies of Imperial, Riverside and San Bernardino counties and will go toward a more complete cementing of the world friendship so happily started in this section by Dr. Guy Bogart, founder of the festival and a prime mover in the opening of International park.

Dr. Bogart, as director of public relations for Beaumont, will direct the planting of these trees, two at least of which will be placed on the high school grounds facing the Ocean-to-Ocean highway, while others will be situated at points of vantage in town and along the already tree-planted approach to International park and the bowl. The trees have been accepted by Mayor Joe Roberts for the city council and at the ceremonial planting next month Consul Toshito Satow of Los Angeles and Secretary J. G. Iseda of the Riverside Japanese association will be present.

Mayor Roberts will then extend formal thanks to the donors for the trees, Supervisor R. E. Dillon will answer for the county and President E. J. Brown for the Rotary club.
