## SIDE LIGHTS ON THE HEMET WATER RATES PETITION

[Special Correspondence] HEMET, June 11.—Forty taxpayers of Hemet filed a petition Wednesday asking the Riverside county supervisors to regulate and control the rates for domestic water, charged by the Hemet Town Water Company, one of W. F. Whittier's corporations. This is the second demand the people of Hemet have made within the last three months for a legal adjustment of their water rates. The first petition contained thirty-one names (the law requires twenty-five), but Whittier's attorneys picked technical flaws in it, so the petitioners were told by the board to come again. They are now coming again, forty strong, and with signatures to spare.

The cause of all the row at Hemet is a set of new rules promulgated in March by the public service corporation, which supplies the handsome little town of Hemet with life-giving fluid for home use.

The consumers claim that the former rate of \$1.50 per month for each lot, with no quantity limit, was high enough, but the said new rules set them to thinking. These rules fixed the quantity of water which the Hemetite might have for one and a half plunks per month at 200 gallons a day. This would give each house 6000 gallons a month, for that money, and is equal to a rate of 25 cents per thousand gallons.

The company also took on a busy streak and generously placed a nice little black iron box in front of the premises of each householder which, when opened, was found to contain an active and lively water meter of the five-eighths inch variety.

Now, when the garden hose is played upon the lawn and the cow takes a drink of water at the same time, the meter buzzes dangerously near the limit and sufficient unto the day is not the water thereof at Hemet. For it has been found, through careful experiments, scientifically carried on by competent residents and taxpayers, therunto duly authorized, that 200 gallons of water will run out through a three-quarter inch hydrant in exactly 14½ minutes. Hence this hurrying to and fro with petitions and this cry to the board "all same" the famous and ancient cry from Macedonia.

It is not that the supply of water is limited at Hemet, heaven forbid, for that favored community is known to have an abundance of it.

The company must either need the money or else somebody has made a mistake in his calculations.

However, after due publication of this second amended petition, the board is directed by the mighty mandate of the act of March 12, 1885, to send for the haughty minions of the company to bring in their books and papers, then and there to explain why they should not have their rates fixed, doctored, regulated, controlled and nailed down for the period of a year, so that they will stay in one place and not wobble about.

The law requires the petition to be advertised for thirty days and when the hearing comes on there will be much dragging out of water accounts and comparisons of rates, as the people are determined in their petition and so is the company in its.
