#### MEXICAN SCHOOL GIRL STEALS TRINKETS

Enters Homes and Takes Away Dolls and Their Toggery and Gold Rings. Marshal Releases Her.

[Enterprise Special News Service] CORONA, Feb. 17.—Thirteen-year-old Alice Vasquez, a Mexican school girl, was found with such a quantity of stolen dolls and trinkets that she would have probably landed in Whittier had she been an older child.

Yesterday afternoon during the absence of the family of William Archer, the little Mexican gained entrance into the home and filled two pillow cases with plunder, trinkets and anything she could find handy during a hasty search of the house.

The child would have made way with the stolen articles, but the sudden return of one of Mr. Archer's daughters frightened her away.

Three gold rings, four dolls and other articles were taken from the Will Feiring home.

Marshal Lyman was notified last evening and this morning went to the grammar school to get the girl who was believed to have stolen the things.

The superintendent, Mrs. Lulu Main, made an effort to get the child to own up, but she stubbornly refused to say anything and during the talk with the superintendent managed to shove two of the rings into the wash basin.

Marshal Lyman then took the girl and in some way managed to have her take him to the Corona packing house, where in loose boxes outside the house she showed up her plunder, mostly dolls and doll toggery, some no doubt

taken from other places than those visited yesterday. There was quite a collection of dollies, enough to fill a packing house box.

Alice then took the officer back to the school and got the hidden rings.

The county probation officer was communicated with and instructed Marshal Lyman to give the child another chance, so she was released from custody.
