Enrollment Total Is 222, a Gain of 29 Over Last Year—Mexican Escapes With Handcuffs On—Beaumont Fruit Man Preparing Fine Exhibit for County Fair

(Daily Press Special News Service) BEAUMONT, Sept. 22.—The Beaumont schools give promise of being larger and better than ever this year. The enrollment on the opening day was 176 in the grammar grades and 46 in the high school, a total of 222.

The increase over the opening day last year is 25 in the grades and 4 in the high school. There will probably be an almost daily addition to the enrollment for a week or two, as quite a number of pupils have not yet entered for various reasons.

Mrs. W. W. Wilkerson received word this week that her husband, who is working in the mines at Cima, Cal., has been quite seriously injured.

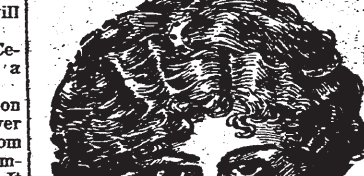
He was unconscious for several days, but word was received he was improving. Rev. T. H. Wilkinson is attending the Methodist conference at Santa Ana this week.
