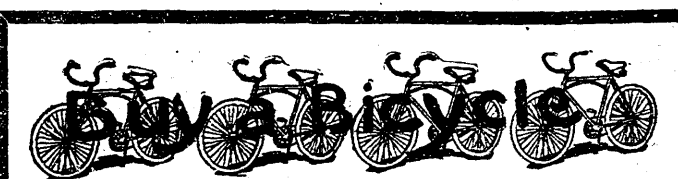
Personals
