

Thousands Expected At Rubidoux Rites

Older than any similar service and as impressive as the gatherings at Death Valley, the Hollywood Bowl or on Santa Catalina island, Riverside's thirty-second annual Easter sunrise service will be held on Mt. Rubidoux tomorrow, beginning at 5:50 a.m.

More than 15,000 Easter pilgrims are expected to converge from all points of the Southland on Riverside. The road up the mountain will be opened at 2:30, trails at 3 o'clock. The road will be closed at 5:30 and the half-hour beginning of the rites over stations of the Mutual Broadcasting company will begin at 6. The road will be reopened at 6:25.

Responsive reading will be led by Dr. Ezra James Egly, pastor of Calvary Presbyterian church. James Coleman Scott, of the junior college faculty and Community Players, will read Henry Van Dyke's "God of the Open Air." Alice Mock will be soloist.

Final rehearsal of the Mt. Rubidoux choir will be held at 7 p.m. at the evening in All Souls Unitarian-Universalist church. Seventh and Lemon streets. Director H. Norman Spohr has emphasized the importance of all singers attending, stating that no cards to the choir will be issued to those failing to report tonight.

The weather man was pessimistic today, saying that while fair weather may be expected tonight and tomorrow, there will be morning cloudiness which probably will shut out the sun. There was a blanket of clouds over the mountain this morning, and .01 inch of rain fell at Corona.

Has Sung Here Before

Miss Mock, now of Hollywood, is a coloratura soprano formerly of the Chicago Civic Opera company. She has appeared on the program of the Riverside Musicians association, and her voice has been praised for its bell-like clarity by Miss Marcelle Craft, artistic director of the Riverside Opera association.

Riverside Boy Scouts will assume their traditional duty of guiding the Easter pilgrims who use the trails up Mt. Rubidoux before dawn. They will assemble at Camp Evans at 5 a.m., where warm food will be served to them. At 2:15 they will receive their instructions from Scout Executive Carl N. Helmick and his aids. They will be at their posts with candles lighted in rustic holders by the time the trails open at 8 o'clock.

Members of the Riverside high school ROTC commanded by Maj. George P. Cummings will assist Riverside police and firemen in patrolling the roads for the safe and orderly movement of traffic.

Also starting at 8:50 a.m. will be Easter rites in other parts of Riverside county as follows: Palo Verde valley—Black Rock, 10 miles west of Blythe on U. S. Highway 60.

Coachella valley — Travertine Point, just off U. S. Highway 99, near Indio.

At Corona — Corona—On hillside opposite Blue Diamond quarry in Temescal canyon. Elsinore—Hampton Hill. Hemet—San Jacinto — Ramona bowl.

Fair Springs—At the "Cross on the Hillside," just back of Desert Inn.

Perris—North side of Maitral hill on north edge of Perris. San Geronimo pass—Two miles up on the new Banning-Idyllwild road.

Other Southland services will be held at Glendale; Rainbow pier, Long Beach; Palos Verdes hills, near San Pedro; Inglewood.

Jury Reports in Midnight Session

A superior court jury of 10 women and two men returned with varying verdicts in the trial of John A. Sutton of Indio, accused of three felony charges relating to a fatal automobile accident, at 12:45 o'clock this morning.

The jury announced the following decisions on the three charges:

Charge No. 1, drunk driving with injury, guilty.

Charge No. 2, negligent homicide, no verdict. Foreman Horace Roberts reporting to Superior Judge G. R. Freeman that the jury stood divided without any hope of reaching a unanimous decision. It was reported the jury was split, seven to five for acquittal.

Charge No. 3, felonious hit and run, not guilty.

Thomas W. Cochrane, defense counsel, filed an application for probation on behalf of his client as to the first charge, and the probationary hearing was continued until April 22.

The charges related to an accident near Indio on January 9 in which Mrs. Grace Douding, a passenger in Sutton's automobile, was killed.

Deputy Dist. Atty. Russell S. Waite announced that at the same time the matter of setting the second charge for retrial will be considered by Judge Freeman.

Mrs. McGillivray was struck by an automobile driven by Jean Sprague Cunningham of 3205 Sixth street, at the intersection of Main streets, according to report of Traffic Officer C. E. Wilson.

The elderly woman, hurled 20 feet by the impact of the automobile, sustained fractures of both legs, a possible skull fracture and severe shock. It was reported.

Coroner Ean F. White assigned Deputy Coroner Seymour L. Cash to investigate the accident and tentatively set Monday as the date of the inquest.

The woman was crossing Main street from east to west when struck by the automobile traveling north. It was reported.

Horton, 122 Grove street, Redlands, traveling towards Riverside on La Cadena Drive, suffered painful injuries when his car went out of control and crossed the highway, striking headon against a light pole. He was taken to the Community hospital for treatment and was released at noon today. The car and the pole both were considerably damaged by the impact.
